COURSE DESCRIPTION AND GOALS

How does gender impact the political process and the politics of a country, and across countries? First, we assess the differences between men and women's political behavior, attitudes, and their participation levels as voters in the United States and around the world. We critically evaluate the different theoretical frameworks used to explain these differences in political behavior. Then, we consider women's participation in government as political candidates and elected representatives. What explains the great variation in the degree of female representation across the world's legislatures? Why did Finland and Sweden have over 40% of women in their parliaments, while democracies like France and the United States have had about 15%? Why have some non-democracies had female Presidents and Prime Ministers, while the US has not? What factors impact the level of female representation, and why does this matter for politics and policy outcomes? For this part of the course, we use an institutions based approach to see what variables help or hurt female candidates win elected offices at the national and local levels across countries, and evaluate the substantive impact of women in politics on various policy outcomes.

Since the first two sections of the course rely on data and scholarship based on more "developed" economies and democracies, the third part of our class explores women's status and opportunities and strategies for political representation and inclusion in non-democracies or "developing" economies. In these contexts, we analyze how women impact politics outside of established political institutions and processes. What resources can women have in such political systems or societies? How have women's movements and other social, political, and economic movements impacted politics at home and internationally? We will also look at the connections between gender inequality and economic and political development; globalization and women's labor; women and war; and the role women have played in recent democratic uprisings in the and social protest movements around the world. We will include the role and impact of new media, especially social and digital media and women's activism and movements. Guest speakers will be invited to present on topics related to women's economic and political empowerment. This is an introductory course that provides a survey of the field so no previous background in political science and/or gender studies is required.



STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students will become familiar with the current political science scholarship on these issues and critically evaluate the different theoretical approaches and methodologies used in the discipline. They will also have the opportunity to explore a topic of personal interest in greater depth, and present their research findings in a simulated student conference at the end of the semester.

COURSE POLICIES

Everyone is expected to actively participate in class discussions and come to class prepared, so all the required readings for each lecture should be done before we meet for class. I will email or distribute preview questions in class to help you prepare for discussion.

Attendance and participation are part of your course grade so if you are frequently absent or late, it will count against you as you cannot participate if you are not here. After 2 freebie absences and 2 freebie late arrivals, I will take points off. If you have participated 3 times in class, I will try to call on others so that we can get as many different perspectives as possible. THE RESEARCH PAPER AND PRESENTATION (8 pages)

This course gives each student an opportunity to investigate an issue or topic of personal interest (related to our course themes) in greater depth. Upon completion of the paper, students will then present their research and findings in a simulated conference at the end of the semester.



Below are some possible papers topics (a separate paper and presentation guideline will be distributed, and you will have an opportunity to develop your paper topic with me and in a group workshop).

- Religion and policies or practices related to women (marriage, divorce, rape, or property rights)
- Women and economic empowerment (policies related to labor, wages, property rights, etc.)
- Policies related to women's health or reproductive rights
- A female politician or leader and how she influenced political or policy change in her country or government
- Women and globalization (sex trafficking, nannies, and female labor migration)
- Women and war (terrorism, rape as a weapon of war, women in the military)
- How institutional changes help or hurt women's representation in a country
- Women and legislative or presidential campaigns in the US or another country (profile of a woman elected to Congress this past November 2018)
- Gender and disaster (planning and policies, climate change and impact on women)
- Maternal Health, education, or other questions related to public policy outcomes for women
- Race, gender, sexual orientation, and politics or policy; use an intersectional analysis
- Gender and justice (US or other countries, legal system, Supreme Court)
- Book/memoir review: Sonia Sotomayer, Michelle Obama, Ruth Bader Ginsberg
- Your paper can also be on the class community service project or a profile of a UB or Bridgeport woman for our archive.
