This course provides an overview of gender and armed conflict from a global perspective. The class may count as an elective for International Studies and Political Science majors/minors, and also for Women's and Gender Studies minors.

In the first weeks of the class, we will learn about theories of gender and war (with an emphasis on fascism). Next, we will apply these theories to 20th and 21st-century case studies of women and war. We will also examine the roles of women in combat and terrorism. The last section of the course concerns women in conflict resolution, transitional justice, and post-conflict situations.

COURSE READINGS: All assigned readings are electronic; some assignments are actually documentaries rather than readings. Minimizing paper keeps down costs, both to you and to the environment. The readings and documentaries are hyperlinked to this syllabus; these appear in <u>underlined font</u>. Depending upon which browser you use, you should be able to double-click or hit control-enter on the underlined text and be whisked away to the reading or documentary. Kindly inform the instructor as soon as possible if you find a broken link. Those readings not hyperlinked to the syllabus will be ahvailable for you to download on the course Canvas page (look for the "Assigned Reading" folder within "Files" -- on the menu to your left). Most of the online readings are PDF files, which you can read with a free download from Adobe Acrobat.

GRADES:

- 2 papers, each worth 20 points. Information about the papers
 - is <u>here</u> _download. You may find the specific questions to answer on the assignment tabs, Paper 1 (March 1) <u>here</u> and Paper 2 (April 20) here.
- 2 exams, each worth 25 points. The link to each exam is under "Quizzes." At least a week before each exam, you will receive an invitation to register with Proctor-U, the exam monitoring service. You will have to register no less than 72 hours in advance with Proctor-U to schedule someone to monitor your exam; they will fine you if you give them shorter notice. Be sure that the

- computer that you will use for the exam, and also the location in which you will take your exam, meet their requirements. Please be aware that the exams are closed-book, closed-notes, closed-browser, and also that material from your classmates' paper presentations will appear on the exams.
- "Participation & discussion" worth 10 points. In each class, please "sign in" by typing your name into the Zoom chat. It's likely that the instructor will send out over Zoom a poll or two during each class. If it emerges that someone has signed in and then absconded, the student will get only partial credit for attending that day. All students will begin the class with a score of a perfect 10 for participation. You will lose points for excessive absences, tardiness, inattention, repeated unwillingness to communicate, or participation that is blatantly not informed by the assigned reading and viewing.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE STUDENT:

- Asking questions is a key component of learning. However, please do not waste time by asking things that can be answered by reading this syllabus.
- There will be a Zoom waiting room to join the class (to prevent Zoombombing). Please try to join class on time. If you absolutely must join class late, however, please understand that you likely will be in the waiting room for a few minutes. The instructor will pause lecturing every five or ten minutes to check for questions from the class -- and also notification of anyone waiting to join.
- Just as you have the right to express your own opinion, so does every other member of the class.
- Please keep your microphone muted unless you are asking a question or participating in a discussion; doing so will improve the sound quality for everyone.
- Students should maintain a professional demeanor during Zoom class (i.e. fully clothed, sober, and not prone). It is preferable that you keep your webcam on during class; it helps the instructor to see faces to determine whether the class is confused, bored, etc. There may, however, be a very good reason why on a particular day you don't want to broadcast your roommate, family member, visitor, etc. to the class, so keeping your camera off is permissible once in a while.
- Please be aware that Zoom is set to automatically record these Zoom classes to the Canvas cloud; UAB administrators have access to anything you or the instructor does within this Canvas course (including messaging). In other words, please do not say or write anything that you would not want UAB administrators to hear or read. If you need to discuss a sensitive matter privately with the instructor, we can set up a one-on-one Zoom meeting outside of Canvas.
- The only reason a student can get an extension on a paper or test is if there is a documented medical or family emergency. In such cases, please notify the

- instructor as soon as possible (preferably before the due date). Students who simply do not turn in a paper will receive a zero on it.
